Building on the findings and recommendations from the UN Special Rapporteur's report - A study on the exploitation and sexual abuse of children in the context of travel and tourism; a closer look at the phenomena of voluntourism

**Format:** A panel discussion building on the findings and recommendations from the UN Special Rapporteur's report – A study on the exploitation and sexual abuse of children in the context of travel and tourism; a closer look at the phenomena of voluntourism.<sup>1</sup> Together with Ms. Mama Fatima Singhateh, the UN Special Rapporteur, and esteemed leaders from governments, private sector, and civil society organisations, we will dive into the report's findings and recommendations.

**Background:** Professional and regulated volunteering should be distinguished from **voluntourism**<sup>2</sup> which evolves around products offered through the travel market usually for unskilled volunteers that pay companies or other entities to travel and work in distant communities, as an attractive alternative to

mass tourism. Although volunteers may have good intentions, such trips may negatively affect the well-being of children, with certain forms of voluntourism posing additional risks to their safety by providing unregulated avenues for offenders to groom, access, and sexually exploit children.

The issue of sexual abuse and exploitation of children in voluntourism is a complex issue which requires extensive and wide-ranging intervention at local, national, regional and international levels by all actors and stakeholders working together. Laws regulating the activities of the public and private sectors in this sector must be strengthened to ensure adequate monitoring, early detection, investigation and penalization of wronging. More can be done in the effective application of existing guidelines, tools and good practices on voluntourism through efficient data-collection systems and effective screening and vetting of volunteers, as well as the introduction and strengthening of measures that ensure the prevention and protection of children within this sector as well as the provision of rehabilitative services and support for children at risk or victims of exploitation and/or abuse.<sup>3</sup>

## Objectives of the panel discussion:

- Unpack the report following its presentation by the UN SR to the UN General Assembly.
- **Discuss the findings and the recommendations** from the report.
- **Step-up collective action** by intergovernmental bodies, governments, businesses, and civil society organisations to regulate the issue of voluntourism by sending and receiving countries based on the recommendations from the report, evidence from the ground, existing practices, and experience.

**Speakers and contributors:** Ms. Mama Fatima Singhateh, the UN Special Rapporteur on the sale, sexual exploitation and sexual abuse of children, representatives of governments, businesses, and civil society organisations including DCI - ECPAT Netherlands as part of the Down to Zero Alliance<sup>4</sup>, Action Pour Les Enfants (APLE), ECPAT Cambodia, PEaCE, ECPAT Sri Lanka, ECPAT Philippines, Tourism Watch, Brot für die Welt, board member of ECPAT Germany, Comhlámh, the Irish association of development workers and volunteers, ReThink Orphanages Network, Better Volunteering Better Care Initiative.

Speakers will cover key thematic topics through knowledge, experience and idea-sharing. The online moderator will involve those attending online to ensure an effective hybrid experience.
