# 9:30 – 10:30 Opening Panel: Challenges to address sexual exploitation of children in the post-COVID era.

This opening section will allow a framework understanding on the current situation of sexual exploitation of children in travel and tourism and its interactions with other manifestations and contexts, in light of the recent reports of the Special Rapporteur and the Special Representative. Instead of a keynote speech, and to re-inforce the idea of a dialogue for the day, the panel moderated by ECPAT International will allow both UN authorities to explain the main highlights of their reports, and to go further in analyzing together the identified challenges and what needs to be done to address them, with a focus in the Americas region. Each group will identify the top five trends they see in travel and tourism that present challenges in protecting children, and highlight up to 8 most pressing actions that could curb the issue.

#### Group debate: distilling challenges by areas Having aligned a common understanding of the child sexual exploitation situation in the region and how it is addressed, by taking into account points of view of different sectors and countries during the morning, this session will allow group debates for specific topics of interest. Participants will pre-register to one of the tables matching their topic of interest for each of the 3 rotations (having each participant the opportunity to participate in discussions over 3 different topics). Each table will discuss, guided by a facilitator, over a specific topic. Each table will answer specific questions. Pre-designated facilitators will use a standard information consolidation template of the findings, that will be collated by a group to gather the agreements and recommendations of the group. Based in a registration closed in the week before the event, participants will receive materials and guiding questions to prepare for the tables they signed-up to.
